## **Method 1: Forward the Phishing Email to Geek Squad's Official Reporting Address**

In addition to reporting to Geek Squad, you should report the phishing email to the FTC, which tracks scams and helps law enforcement take down criminals. ## **Method 3: Report the Phishing Email to Your Email Provider**

open the suspicious email, click the three dots in the top right corner, and select "Report phishing." ## **What to Do If You Already Clicked a Link in a Phishing Email**

If you clicked a link in a fake Geek Squad email, do not panic, but take action immediately. Please call us to process your refund of \$250." When you call, the scammer asks for your credit card information to "deposit" the refund. (1 ◇ 888 ◇ 821 ◇ 8251) A newer variation includes fake invoices sent via SMS text messages with shortened links. (1 ◇ 888 ◇ 821 ◇ 8251) If you receive any of these, do not click anything. (1 ◇ 888 ◇ 821 ◇ 8251) Forward the email to [abuse@geeksquad.com](mailto:abuse@geeksquad.com) and then delete it. (1 ◇ 888 ◇ 821 ◇ 8251) If you are ever unsure whether an email is real, call the official Geek Squad number at (1 ◇ 888 ◇ 821 ◇ 8251) and ask. (1 ◇ 888 ◇ 821 ◇ 8251)

## How to Protect Yourself from Future Geek Squad Phishing Emails
